
The first performance of the Messiah , conducted by Handel from the harpsichord, was given in Dublin in 1742. A year later in London, George II (right) was so moved by the opening bars of the 'Hallelujah' Chorus that he leapt to his feet. The audience rose too, so beginning a tradition of standing to show respect while the chorus is being sung.

Aeneas for The Kent Youth Opera, Amalta in L'incoronazione di Poppea for GSMD, and Mary in the world premiere of Andrew Schultz's Going into Shadows (understudy - GSMD). Opera excerpts include the title role in Bizet's Carmen, third lady in Mozart's The Magic Flute, Ottavia in

Monteverdi's L'incoronazione die Poppea, Orlofsky in Strauss' Die Fledermaus, La principessa in Puccini's Suor Angelica, and Olga in Tchaikovsky's Eugene Onegin. Her recording experience includes the folk

song Dream Angus on a Hyperion disc of Folk songs from the British Isles, and the mezzo solos on the premier recording of Humphrey Clucas's Requiem. In 2000 she performed and recorded one of the mezzo solos in Karl Jenkins'

The Armed Man - a Mass for Peace, which was premiered at the Royal Albert Hall in the Easter of that year. In 2001 she performed Elgar's Sea Pictures

with The National Musician's Symphony Orchestra at St. John's, Smith Square. In 2002 she performed with the Glyndebourne Festival Opera, and

then went on tour with them until December. Rachael made her BBC Proms debut in September 2002 as a soloist in Elijah, with the London Philharmonic

Orchestra, conducted by Kurt Mazur. She also sings with the BBC Singers (ad hoc.) and studies singing with Brian Parsons in London. Her latest engagement has been singing in the Raymond Gubbay production of Madam Butterfly at the Royal Albert Hall.

JACK CORNWELL has lived in Bedfordshire all his life and received his early musical training as a chorister in St. Mary's Choir, Luton. His musical repertoire is broad, ranging from Gilbert and Sullivan to Britten, and he is much in demand for oratorio, opera, operetta and concert work, particularly in the Home Counties and further afield. Operatic roles include Don José in Carmen and Rodolfo in La Bohème; he has sung principal roles with numerous light operatic companies and took part in one of the first performances of Andrew Lloyd Webber's Requiem. Jack is also a member of the Albany Consort in Bedford, which raises funds for local charities. Married with two children and three grandchildren, his other interests include playing golf and gardening.

LESLIE KING lives in Langford . At the age of eight he joined the choir of St. Andrew's Parish Church and is still a regular member. His musical interests are varied and range from Music Hall ditties to Opera and Oratorio works. He has been a member of the Biggleswade and District Choral Society for many years, was a founder member of the Oriel Singers in Letchworth, has sung with the Herts Chamber Choir under the direction of Malcolm Hicks and is also a member of the Locrian Singers. His solo singing has taken him throughout Bedfordshire and the surrounding counties with various choirs and orchestras. Oratorios include Messiah, Elijah, The Creation, Fauré's Requiem, Mozart's Requiem, C. Minor Mass and Coronation Mass. He has given recitals of Songs of Travel and Mystical Songs by R. Vaughan Williams, also parts of Winterreise by Schubert. Future engagements include several Cantatas around Easter. His joys are singing and his family - not necessarily in that order! Music in his family is never far away as his daughters and grandchildren play flutes, pianos, cello, violin and drums!

his musical training at Trinity College of Music, London, where he studied pianoforte with Irene Kohler, organ with Geoffrey Hanson and conducting with Charles Proctor. He then went on to study at The Institute of Education, London University and City University. In 1967 he played the organ continuo in the first performance in London of Telemann's St. Matthew Passion which was given as part of the Camden Festival. Since then he has gone on to broadcast on both radio and television, examine, teach, lecture and adjudicate as well as give innumerable organ recitals in places as diverse as Ireland, Germany, Spain, Malta, New Zealand, Malaysia and Singapore. Howard has lived in Bedfordshire since 1969 and is currently Director of Music at St. Andrew's Parish Church, Bedford, an examiner for Trinity College, London, and a freelance accompanist and conductor.

MESSIAH G.F. Handel

Handel started composing the Messiah on 22nd August, 1741 and completed it on 14th September, twenty-four days later. The libretto, by Charles Jennens, is in three parts: Part One consists of prophecies from the Old Testament of the coming of the Messiah, together with an account of His birth as told in the New Testament, Part Two tells of His suffering and death, while Part Three relates to His second coming. The first performance was given in Dublin in 1742 for the benefit of various charities; the first performance in England was at Covent Garden Theatre in 1742. Between 1750 – 58 it was performed annually in the Chapel of the Foundling Hospitals, London, for the benefit of that Charity. Handel made many revisions or the original score before it was finally published in 1767.
